Welcome to our Autumn newsletter where you will find details of our winter programme of talks. We meet in Milton Hall, Cooper Crescent, off Nightingale Road, Carshalton, SM5 2DL at 3 p.m. and finish with tea and cakes. The Programme Committee have put together another interesting series of talks. Non-members are welcome at a cost of £3.

There are a number of challenges to our continuing Summer programme of outings. There is the uncertainty about rising costs of coach travel and the dwindling numbers of members who like to participate in outings. On the plus side most of the places of interest we like to visit are fully open and keen to welcome visitors.

This summer there have been three enjoyable outings to Michelham Priory in June, Butser Ancient farm in August and a visit to the Rural Life Living Museum Farnham and Waverley Abbey in September. The July outing to Lewes Castle and Anne of Cleves House was cancelled as there were not enough people to cover the cost of coach hire.

Despite all the uncertainties the Programme committee have begun outline planning of the Summer Programme. The proposals so far are:-

28th June 2023 Proposed visit to Lullingstone Roman Villa followed by a visit to Lullingstone Castle, Church and World Garden.

The Visit to Lullingstone Castle would include a conducted tour of both the Manor House, Church and Garden.

July 2023 Strawberry Hill House

August 2023 Syon House and Garden

September 2023 West Horsley Place and Church, A Grade 1 listed medieval manor house dating from 1425 set in an estate of great beauty.

October 2023 We are exploring options for either the Musical Museum in Brentford or the London Transport Museum Depot. A visit to Headstone Manor in Harrow is also another possibility.

Roman Excavations at Flexford

David Calow director of the Excavations of a Roman site at Flexford near Guildford Surrey will give a talk about the excavations there.

The area we now call Surrey was mostly rural in the Roman period but geophysics and metal detecting are shining a new light and showing wide area, coin-rich Roman sites can be found in the countryside. David Calow, Honorary Secretary of Surrey Archaeological Society, will talk about some coin-rich Roman rural settlement sites in Surrey and South East England and suggest all may not be quite as the textbooks imply.

Flexford has been excavated over a number of seasons and has produced a wealth of evidence about Roman activity there. Roman blacksmiths' hearths, pottery, flints, debris and human and animal bone fragments as well as evidence of buildings are among some of the finds.

individuals involved in its growth and decline. Starting with the influx of the Huguenot refugees from France and Holland bringing with them Peter Mauvillian who established one of the first calico print works at Ravensbury.

Mick Taylor of the Wandle Industrial Museum will give a talk about The Calico People of the Wandle Valley

The talk covers the history and heritage of the textile industry of the River Wandle. It looks at a selection of the people involved in the industry from the Mauvillian family to William Morris. It also explores the influence of the Hugeunots in the late 16th and early 17th centuries. The talk will also cover some of the methods used in production of calico and the patterns.

The textile industry along the Wandle Valley was in existence for over 250 years. Over this period there were a number of noticeable families and

The uses of Lidar in archaeology by Anne Sassin

Lidar is a technique available to achaeologists. It uses airborne lasers to produce a 3D map of the ground surface without any of the vegetation such as trees.

It can discover archaeological sites which would otherwise remain hidden e.g. in forests and can also highlight shallow earthworks which are very hard to see on the ground.

A description from Jacky Oliver about the September outing she organised to Waverley Abbey and Rural Life and living Museum Farnham. "After a pleasant walk across fields to the spectacular remains of the 13th century Cistercian Abbey we made our way to the Rural Life and Living Museum.
