Winter Programme

Saturday 4th November 2023 at 2:30 p.m.

Stewart Cocker, Countryside Manager of Epsom & Ewell Borough Council, will give a talk on the Horton Light Railway

The Horton Light Railway had its origins in a contractor's line (the Ewell & Long Grove Railway) built in 1905 to transport building materials, coal and other supplies for London County Council's Epsom Cluster of psychiatric hospitals in

the Horton area to the North-West of the town of Epsom.

The Light Railway
Order did not permit the
carriage of passengers.
The railway connected
with the mainline
network just south
of Ewell West railway
station.



Saturday 2nd December 2023 at 2:30 p.m.

Peter Wakeham, Chairman of the Downlands Trust, will give an illustrated talk about the **Springs and Watercourses of Carshalton** and the manner in which they influenced the early development of the area. The presentation will focus on two estates, Carshalton Park and what is now St Philomenas School.



There is currently a project underway to improve the water quality and amenity of the Upper and Lower Ponds by removing sediment and undertaking surveys and repairs of the pond structure. The proposed works comprise draining the ponds and removing the sediment. Whilst drained and clean, the engineered base and sides of the ponds and associated infrastructure are to be surveyed (topographically and visually) and recorded.

Saturday 6th January 2024 at 2:30 p.m.

Sarah Jayne, social historian, will give a talk on the Crystal Palace Dinosaurs.

Friends of the Crystal Palace
Dinosaurs is a heritage charity
aiming to conserve the Dinosaurs
and their surroundings for future
generations, and to promote public
knowledge and enjoyment of the
site. Their presentation will take
you on a journey through deep
geological time in addition to
Victorian science and public
education. Discover tales of
outrageous publicity stunts,
celebrity visits, and scientific
arguments, and find out why the
site is in Crystal Palace Park, who



discovered the extinct animals and who built the sculptures?

Saturday 3rd February 2024 at 2:30 p.m.

Alan Johnstone of the **Wey and Arun Canal Trust** will give a talk about the history and ongoing restoration of the Wey and Arun Canal, a 23 mile canal which runs between the river Wey in Surrey and the River Arun in Sussex. It was constructed to avoid attacks by French Privateers on British Merchant ships in the English Channel during the Napoleonic Wars, but by the time it was completed in 1815 the wars were over, though the canal did prove to be a boon to regional trade and the villages along its route. Competition by railways in the late 1860s led to declining trade and its final abandonment in 1871.

The Wey and Arun Canal Trust was formed in the 1970s and is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year. Over the years it has restored a number of locks and bridges and 2 aqueducts and has cleared much of the canal of vegetation. It now has 2 information centers from one of which cruises are run. All of the canal's route is in private ownership which has meant that the restoration has been dependent on the goodwill of the landowners, but the Trust has recently started to acquire some of the land. When restored the canal will link Britain's inland waterways to the English Channel.

Nathalie Cohen will present the results of the most recent season of excavation at the **National Trust property Smallhythe**, which lies on the Kent/Sussex border.

Over 3 weeks in August 2023 a team of over 100 volunteers working with professional archaeologists from Archaeology South east, Museum of London Archaeology and Historic England explored the Roman, Medieval and Post Medieval past of this now tiny riverside settlement. They revealed lost buildings and routeways, evidence for Medieval ship building and artefacts which will help to tell the stories of those who lived here before us.




Saturday 11th May 2024 at 2:30 p.m.
